### **HH Social Club Marks Sixteen Years of Intergenerational Care at Tuen Ng Festival**

*Hopewell and St. James' Settlement continue to care for solitary elderly, benefiting over 15,000 people*

Hong Kong, June 18, 2026 – Hopewell Holdings Limited (“Hopewell”) has once again joined hands with St. James’ Settlement to organize the 15<sup>th</sup> annual HH Social Club Tuen Ng Volunteer Programme, continuing its commitment to bringing warmth and festive blessings to elderly singletons. The program has benefitted over 14,000 elderly individuals to date.

The “HH Social Club Tuen Ng Volunteer Programme” has entered its sixteenth year. Jointly organized by Hopewell Holdings Limited (“Hopewell”) and St. James’ Settlement, the program continues to focus on caring for solitary elderly. Through companionship and blessings, volunteers have brought warmth to thousands of seniors in the community. Over the years, more than 15,000 elderly have benefited, with footprints of love spread across the community, bearing witness to the power of intergenerational connection and care.

Beyond home visits, volunteers encouraged elderly to step outside and join group activities. Fifteen volunteers accompanied more than 30 elderly on group outings to Wun Chuen Sin Koon and the Lam Tsuen Wishing Tree, sharing a vegetarian banquet and spending a warm weekend together. Volunteers also distributed rice dumplings prepared by Hopewell Hotel and gift packs, bringing festive blessings.

Hopewell actively promoted intergenerational exchange this year. In addition to continuing its collaboration with Vocational Training Council students, Lingnan University students joined for the first time, enabling more young people to partner with Hopewell volunteers in spreading care. On May 30, 2026, 15 Lingnan University students (including two Huadu Scholarship recipients), 10 Vocational Training Council students, together with 47 ‘HH Social Club’ volunteers and their families, visited more than 60 elderly living alone in Wan Chai, Causeway Bay, Tin Hau, North Point, and Tsuen Wan, delivering festive blessings and gift packs. Prior to the visits, volunteers attended a briefing session organized by St. James’ Settlement to learn communication skills with the elderly, making intergenerational exchanges more natural and heartfelt.

This year, the program also extended for the first time to assisting elderly in decluttering their homes. Hopewell Hotel management, together with volunteers, entered hoarding households to help clear and reduce clutter, creating more living space, lowering accident risks, and improving living conditions for the elderly.

Mrs. Ivy Wu Kwok, Director of Hopewell Holdings Limited, said, “The ‘HH Social Club Tuen Ng Volunteers Programme’ has spanned sixteen years, growing alongside the community. Hopewell has always been committed to corporate social responsibility, encouraging employees and young people to join hands in volunteer service. Watching students and colleagues pay home visits together, offering care and blessings, deeply moved me with the strength of intergenerational harmony. This goodwill extends beyond the Tuen Ng Festival, it is a lasting promise to keep love flowing through the community.”

Ms Choi, Senior Service Manager (Continuing Care Service) of St. James’ Settlement, added, “Over the years, the interaction between volunteers and elderly has become one of the most precious bonds in the community. This year we continued organizing outings, encouraging elderly to step outside, enjoy sightseeing and meals with volunteers, and regain social joy. These moments of laughter and exchange are the spiritual support elderly need most. ‘HH Social Club’ not only delivers material gift packs but also companionship and care, helping elderly feel they are an integral part of the community.”

Founded by the Rt. Rev. Bishop R.O. Hall of the Anglican Church in 1949, St. James' Settlement began as a club for boys and girls in a temple in Stone Nullah Lane, Wanchai. It was then developed into a six-storey building on Kennedy Road in 1963 to provide diversified services, including children and youth services, elderly services and rehabilitation services. In 1987, the headquarters was opened in Stone Nullah Lane so that the scope of services could be further extended. Our first centre outside Wanchai (named Central and Western District Elderly Community Centre) was established in 1990. Since then, different service centres have been developed and most of them are located along the north coast of Hong Kong Island, from The Belcher's in Western to Hing Wah Estate in Chai Wan. In recent years, in view of the society's ever-changing needs, we have opened service centres in Kowloon and the New Territories. To date, our 96 service points are in operation across Hong Kong, serving more than 3.23 million person-times, and our target beneficiaries include children, teenagers, families, the elderly and people with disabilities.
